Ringling Glass Art Pavilion Complete and Opening Soon

It's a wrap! We are pleased to announce the completion of the Kotler-Coville Glass Art Pavilion on FSU's Ringling Museum of Art campus in Sarasota, FL. The two-story, 5,500-square-foot space, adjacent to the visitors' pavilion, will showcase the museum's collection of over 200 pieces of studio art glass. "This has been one of our most unique and challenging projects to-date," Hays Layerd said. "Managing control of natural sunlight impacting a highly visible gallery was a



challenge," Hays said. It was overcome through exterior-mounted, light-controlling fins made of anodized aluminum and sculpturally shaped to reflect the natural 'art' found in the shape of sand ripples impacted by ocean waves. The Museum will host a ribbon cutting ceremony on January 21, and the building opens to the public on January 22.



Ballard Partners Moves Into 201 E. Park Avenue

One of downtown Tallahassee's newest buildings, 201 E. Park Avenue, on the corner of Park Avenue and Monroe Street is now occupied by Brian Ballard and his lobbying firm, Ballard Partners. The firm moved into the 5th and 6th floors just in time for the 2018 Legislative Session to begin. The first-floor lobby has a mix of materials and accessories that are both classic and whimsical. "From the porcelain marble floors, to the balloon chandeliers suspended from a gypsum cloud, this is a refreshing space," said ALW Interior Designer, Lindsy Grosso. The 5th and 6th floor

suites offer a sophisticated corporate environment with natural light that illuminates the space through sidelight windows in each office, as well as a folding window wall in the event room that opens to a lush terrace overlooking the Chain of Parks. The building's remaining floors are still being completed for various tenants, but are expected to be occupied by the end of the year.

Design Award Received for Residence

In December, we received an award for excellence in design from AIA Tallahassee. The project consists of a 3,000-square foot residence (shown right) that was thoughtfully designed to respect the mass and scale of the surrounding, existing neighborhood while embracing a contemporary design inspired by light and materiality. Highlights of this residence include custom millwork, iconic masonry fireplaces, a large master suite with a day-lit walk-in closet, double shower opening into a garden, a large screened-in porch and swimming pool.



Barrier-free design concepts were employed throughout the design to allow the owners to age gracefully while enjoying a strong connection to the exterior environment.
